Summary of rule changes for USSSA Fast Pitch 2018

NOTE: Maryland does not have an Elite Select Program

Jewelry Rule-

Rule Change "Exposed jewelry, which is judged by the umpire to be dangerous, must be removed and may not be worn during the game." No change to medical alert jewelry. Coaches wristbands (play indicators) are legal but must be worn as designed.

SUM Policy:

Covered jewelry will be permitted.

Small studs are permitted and do not have to be covered.

Dangling hoops, necklaces, bracelets, rings, etc. are prohibited.

Nothing on the wrist/arm to include watches, bracelets, rubber/string wrist bands, fit bits, hair ties.

Confines of the playing field—Clarifies that warm-up catchers outside of live ball territory must wear a <u>catcher's</u> helmet/mask by including those areas in the definition of the confines of the field. This includes the field, dugouts, and any warm-up area in view of the umpire(s).

Roster Batting Option (Not applicable to the Elite Select Program) -- Allows a team the option to bat its entire roster (all player's physically present) in lieu of a traditional line-up. Teams choosing to roster bat may disperse additional players (AP's) starters who aren't listed as defensive players, anywhere in their batting order so as to bat everyone present. If a player leaves the game for any reason, it creates an absent player and an automatic out situation.

Last completed at bat courtesy runner option (Not applicable to the Elite Select Program) --Team's may now use the last completed at bat (LCAB) player if no unused substitute is available. Under this change, a team will always have a courtesy runner (CR) option, even if roster batting.

The LCAB courtesy runner is determined at the time the courtesy runner is requested, skipping batters

i)currently on base

ii)who are the pitcher or catcher of record

iii) who have already courtesy run for the other position in the same inning ...

In the first inning, if there is no CR available using the above method, the LCAB CR shall be the player furthest away in the batting order. i.e., the LCAB CR for the leadoff batter is the last batter listed last in the lineup.

Short-handed rule modification—Clarifies that multiple absent players (automatic outs) are allowed.

2018 USSSA Fast Pitch Rules

This is intended as quick summary of areas of significant differences in USSSA Fast Pitch rules.

Pitching Distance 35 ft (10U); 40 ft (12U); 43 ft (14U and above) USSSA 1.1

Players shall not use other teams on deck circle. USSSA 1.2.A

Metal Cleats prohibited (12U and younger) USSSA 2.4

Bat must have 2013 USSSA 1.20 BPF Thumbprint Mark USSSA 2.10

The Mercy Rule is 12 runs after 3 innings, 10 runs after 4 innings, or 8 runs after 5 innings. USSSA 4.4

Team may bat 9, 10, 11 or all players present. By using No, One, Two or more Additional Player(s). USSSA 5.3 {9 defensive fielders}

The Designated Player (DP) / FLEX is optional but must be declared before the game starts. USSSA 5.4

A player may be removed as a pitcher and returned as a pitcher only once per inning. USSSA 5.5.B

All Starters & Substitutes may re-enter USSSA 5.6. This includes the DP and FLEX.

A team may use 3 defensive conferences per game; 1 per extra inning; pitcher removed as a pitcher for game. USSSA 4.8.A

The pitcher must start with both feet on the rubber. USSSA 6.1

A team may use a courtesy runner for the pitcher or catcher. It must be a player who has not been in game (except as a courtesy runner). The player may not be used for both positions in same inning. If there is no eligible player, the Last Completed At Bat (LCAB) may be used as a courtesy runner

A courtesy runner may not be used for the DP unless they are the pitcher or catcher of record. USSSA 8.3

If the courtesy runner is injured, another courtesy runner or the pitcher or catcher may run for her. USSSA 8.3.E

After reaching First, may use either white or orange portion of the double first base. 8.17.K.3

10&Under C

- 1. Can not steal Home 15. (8.1)
- 2. No uncaught third strike rule 15 (8.4.B)
- 3. 5 runs per inning for first two (2) innings; unlimited after 2nd inning.

4. Can steal more than one base at a time on pitch and/or base on balls (subject to 1. Above)

5. Infield fly rule is in effect 15 (8.17.)



THREE PART PRE-GAME

PART 1—Pre planning

- Insure all equipment and uniforms are ready for the next day / weekend.
- Make sure you have good directions to the park you are assigned to.
- Arrive no later than 30 minutes prior to game time

PART 2—Arrival at Park

When you arrive at park, Find the Umpire Camp Parking and Contact the UIC

Find your partners are and discuss how you are going to "work the game"

- Fair/Foul Coverage
- Tag-Up/Touches
- Fly Ball to the outfield
- Coverage of Third Base
- Uncaught Third Strike
- Batted Balls that hit batter while in box.
- Umpire to Umpire Communication

Find game balls and be on field at home plate at least 5 minutes before game time. Leave jewelry and cell phones in your vehicle.

PART 3—Pre game conference

The home plate Umpire conducts the pre-game conference and both umpires should be at the conference. Base umpire stands at the front of plate / Plate umpire stands at the back of plate

Have coaches and team captains (if they have them) introduce themselves.

Home plate Umpire introduce base umpire then himself

Accept the lineup cards from the coaches. Check to see the following:

- Are the proper number of players are listed?
- Are both the first and last names are listed?
- Are there are no duplicate numbers?
- Are substitutes are listed below the starters?
- Are there additional player/players (AP) and/or DP/FLEX are being used and they are listed in the correct spot? The Designated Player (DP) is listed in the lineup where they are batting. The FLEX is listed last on the lineup.
- Are they using roster batting? If so, ALL players present must be in the batting order. Any late arriving players must be added to the end of the batting order.

If there are any problems, get them resolved now

Once the lineup card is checked, hand it back to the coach and let him review it one more time, when you get it back then the lineup becomes official.

Ask if all players and equipment are legal and in compliance with USSSA rules. You must get a verbal reply of "yes".

Briefly cover the following:

Ground Rules for that field

- Any unique rules for that field
- Identify all openings in the field area where the ball may leave the field of play.
- Cover the rule for a trapped ball/ past a temporary fence, etc.

Cover the Run Rule/Time limit

Cover Jewelry

Determine Home and Away team USSSA points / Coin Flip (make sure you have a coin for flip) Higher seed on Sunday

All of this should take no more than 2 minutes

No Warnings may be issued at the pre-game

GENERAL INFORMATION

WHAT DOES THE USSSA LIABILITY POLICY COVER?

The General Liability Policy protects you from lawsuits arising out of bodily injury or property damage to others during the practice or play of the insured sport.

WHAT DOES THE USSSA ACCIDENT POLICY COVER?

The Participant Accident Policy pays for covered medical expenses incurred within one year after an accident, to a maximum of \$100,000 per accident for each insured person. Treatment must begin within 30 days of an accident. Coverage is provided on a secondary basis. If other collectible insurance is in force, it must be used as primary. If no other coverage is in force, this coverage becomes primary.

WHAT IS THE POLICY LIMIT ON THE USSSA GENERAL LIABILITY POLICY?

\$2,000,000 Per Occurrence (this is the maximum limit that will be paid in any one occurrence) No Aggregate Limit (this is the maximum limit payable in any one policy term)

DO THE USSSA GENERAL LIABILITY POLICIES COVER LAWSUITS FROM ATHLETIC PARTICIPANTS?

Yes. This is crucial coverage which is often excluded on other general liability policies.

OFFICIALS INSURANCE (FOR USSSA ACTIVITIES)

WHEN OFFICIATING A USSSA ACTIVITY, WHAT INSURANCE IS PROVIDED FOR ME?

For USSSA registered officials only, the following coverages are provided: Secondary accident medical insurance with a \$20,000 limit with a \$500 deductible.

General liability insurance with a \$2,000,000 per occurrence, no aggregate limit. Coverage is provided for USSSA registered officials only.

AM I COVERED WHILE OFFICIATING A PRESEASON OR PRACTICE GAME?

Yes, but only for an activity involving USSSA registered teams.

MOST OF MY OFFICIATING IS FOR USSSA, BUT SOMETIMES I CALL AN UNSANCTIONED TOURNAMENT. DOES MY INSURANCE COVER THESE UNSANCTIONED TOURNAMENTS?

No. USSSA Officials insurance covers USSSA sanctioned activities only. (See next section – Officials Insurance for Non-USSSA activities.)

I HAVE MY OWN MEDICAL INSURANCE AND AM INJURED WHILE OFFICIATING. DO I HAVE TO FILE THE CLAIM WITH MY INSURANCE CARRIER?

Yes. The officials accident medical coverage is secondary to any other insurance in force.

I WAS INJURED OFFICIATING A USSSA EVENT. WHAT PROCEDURE SHOULD I FOLLOW?

First, turn your claim in to your primary insurer, if you have primary insurance. Second, call Jenkins Insurance Group, at 888-880-3602 for a claim form. Claim forms will be sent out only to the injured official after verifying registration at National Headquarters. Do not hold your claim form! File it immediately and forward all bills to the claims administrator upon receipt.

IF I AM SUED FOR MY ACTIONS DURING A USSSA ACTIVITY, WHAT SHOULD I DO?

If you are sued or threatened to be sued in writing, immediately send the information to Jenkins Insurance Group, 1765 Challenge Way, Suite 200, Sacramento, CA 95815. Include your full name, address, daytime telephone number, and names and addresses of any witnesses.

AM I COVERED IF INJURED IN AN AUTOMOBILE ACCIDENT GOING TO OR FROM AN OFFICIATING ASSIGNMENT?

No. Travel coverage is not included.

ARE MY EYEGLASSES OR CONTACT LENSES COVERED?

No. Personal property is not covered.

IS CHIROPRACTIC CARE COVERED FOR OFFICIAL INJURIES?

Yes. Subject to the policy limits.

I WAS INJURED WHILE OFFICIATING A USSSA GAME. I WANT TO WAIT UNTIL THE END OF THE SEASON FOR TREATMENT. IS THIS COVERED?

No. Treatment must begin within 30 days of the date of the injury, and be concluded within 52 weeks of the injury date.

I SUFFERED A HEAT STROKE WHILE OFFICIATING A USSSA TOURNAMENT. DOES OUR OFFICIALS MEDICAL INSURANCE COVER THIS?

No. Heat stroke, heart attack, dehydration, etc. are illnesses. The officials policy covers accident medical injuries only, not illness or disease.

OFFICIALS INSURANCE (FOR NON-USSSA ACTIVITIES)

CAN I PURCHASE INSURANCE TO COVER NON-USSSA OFFICIATING?

Yes. Available only to USSSA registered officials, coverage can be purchased to cover non-USSSA officiating, only in the sports that USSSA sanctions.

WHAT IS THE COST?

Based on age of the Official. \$25 (adults) or \$12 (youth), in addition to the USSSA officials registration fee.

WHAT COVERAGE IS PROVIDED FOR ME?

The same coverage provided to all USSSA officials (see preceding section).

HOW CAN I PURCHASE THIS COVERAGE?

Through your state umpire-in-chief, state director, or the area director who registered you as a USSSA official.

WHAT IS THE POLICY PERIOD?

January 1, 2013 to January 1, 2014.

2018 USSSA Fast Pitch RULES CHANGES NOTE: Maryland does not have an Elite Select Program

Revised Rule 2.5 **JEWELRY** (Youth only - 18 & Under and younger) "Exposed jewelry, which is judged by the umpire to be dangerous, must be removed and may not be worn during the game. Coaches wristbands (play indicators) are legal but must be worn as designed."

New definition in Rule 3 CONFINES OF THE PLAYING FIELD

"The confines of the playing field includes the field of play, the designated dugout/bench area, and any enclosed or clearly marked area that is designated as a warmup area that is adjacent to the field and within the view of the umpire(s)." Rationale for new definition: to define WHERE Rules 2.2 and 14.6 apply.

Addition to Rule 8.3.B: **LAST COMPLETED AT BAT** (LCAB) COURTESY RUNNER OPTION (Non-ELITE SELECT DIVISIONS ONLY)

ADD "if and only if a team has no available unused substitutes, then and only then they may use the Last Completed at Bat (LCAB) as a courtesy runner, subject to all other applicable restrictions (cannot run for both positions in the same inning, etc). The LCAB courtesy runner is determined at the time the courtesy runner is requested, skipping batters

i) currently on base,

ii) who are the pitcher or catcher of record, or

iii) who have already courtesy run for the other position in the same inning..In the first inning, if there is no CR available using the above method, the LCAB CR shall be the person furthest away in the batting order (i.e., the LCAB CR for the lead off batter is the last batter listed in the lineup)"

Revised Rule 5.2 SHORT-HANDED RULE

ADD "(Non-ELITE SELECT divisions):

A team may drop more than 1 batting position (i.e., may have multiple absent players), provided the lineup is maintained with at least 8 batters physically present. All other restrictions above apply.

If a team has multiple absent players and an eligible substitute arrives, she must enter the game immediately in the first available absent player position due up in the batting order."

Addition to Rule 5.3: ROSTER BATTING (Non-ELITE SELECT DIV ONLY)

ADD "ROSTER BATTING OPTION – (non-ELITE SELECT divisions) Teams may use additional APs to bat their entire roster (i.e., ALL players present), subject to the restrictions of Rule 5.2 and 5.3"

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
